Steps 1, 2 and 3

Help me to experience different types of music, what do I respond most to? Pop songs or rock music! Fast, slow heavy, soft.

Hold me and move to the music , tap the beat on different parts of my body

Read a story to me. What voice do I respond to more? A quiet soft tone or a loud gruffly voice!



<u>Auditory stimuli</u>

Sing a range of lullabies and interactive songs with me. Watch and see whether it soothes me or do I move more. Use instruments too, do I enjoy listening to a particular sound , do I still and stop moving? How do I respond to any sounds?





Now that I am listening and making my own sounds do I stop and start to take turns with you making noises?

Steps 4-5

Play with my toys with me. Put them to my left and right, do I turn to my

favourite toy to listen to the sound or look at the lights? How long do I stay interested?

Book Skills

Share a story with me, encourage me to look at the book. Use musical and feely books. Watch me, do I directly look at the book, reach towards, it?



When we play together do I laugh or vocalise to show my enjoyment? Do I respond to different touch or sounds? Sing our favourite repetitive rhyme, whether it be Row, row, row your boat or Round and round a garden. Hold me so they can feel my body moving in different directions. Am I beginning to anticipate a movement to a repetitive song/ rhyme. Play peek a boo with me, tickle me, do I know what's coming next?

Steps 6-7

<u>Book skills</u>

Share a wide range of stories with child , encourage them to look at the book. Allow your child to actively explore a range of musical, touchy feely, pop up books and sensory stories. Do they show a preference to a particular story or rhyme.



I will be really tuning in and listening to the different sounds you make when talking to me now. I might know when you've asked me a question as your voice will go up at the end. Do I try and answer you?

My sounds might be changing now. What sounds do I make? Do I show that I know I have made the sound? Do I repeat it?

Suggested stories/ rhymes

- Little peter rabbit Roll em! I'm a little teapot Ted goes to bed Lets go home little bear
- The enormous crocodile

<u>Story massage</u>

Sit with me and do an on body story massage. Do I show a preference to a certain action you do such as tapping, rolling etc. Do I respond to your sounds? Having sound conversations with you is still really important for helping me learn to make speech sounds

Interactive rhymes

Keep sharing the interactive rhymes and songs with me. I love repetition and won't get bored. The more you do it with me, the more I'll learn?

Head, Shoulders, knees and toes

Head, shoulders, knees and toes, knees and toes. Head, shoulders, knees and toes, knees and toes and eyes and ears and mouth and nose. shoulders, knees and toes, knees toes!

Steps 8 & 9

Book skills / sensory stories

Share a wide range of stories with your child . These may include touchy feely, musical and pop-up books. Model labelling some simple pictures in the book . Encourage you child to hold a book the right way up. And turn the pages from beginning to end.
